About Koitur

"Koitur" is a word in the Gondi language, which the Gond use to refer to themselves. It broadly translates to "people" or "human" and envisions that all of humanity is connected by virtue of belonging to one species. The exclusion of the voices of the Gond and other tribal groups in policy making and law is largely due to the systematic exclusion of indigenous languages and denial of their rights over land and resources.

The Centre for Law and Indigenous Studies, has been set up to promote these lost voices and encourage academic discussion on issues of customary tribal laws amongst other themes.

In pursuance of the same, a Bi-Annual Magazine named "Koitur" is being launched to promote literary writing on themes that surround the struggles and challenges of indigenous groups while at the same time documenting their world to raise awareness regarding the unique customary practices that are found in and other tribal states. The Centre is currently inviting Articles for Volume 1 Issue 1 of the Bi-Annual Magazine, Koitur.

Call for Articles

The Centre for Law and Indigenous Studies is inviting articles from academicians, researchers, professionals, practitioners and students in the fields of tribal lifestyle, customary laws, tribal identity, adivasi writing, tribal tourism, issues relating to tribal women, constitutionality of tribal movements or any other topic related to the areas on the broader themes as given below:

Submission Guidelines

- 1. The word limit for the Articles is 1000-1200 words which must be submitted in MS Word format.
- 2. Font: Times New Roman, Font Size: 12, Line Spacing: 1.5, A4 size paper with 1" margin on all sides.
- 3. The Article must be accompanied by a brief introduction of the author indicating his/her email id, contact number, designation and official address.
- 4. The Article must not exceed 10% similarity index under any plagiarism detection software.
- 5. For references and bibliography, the author is required to follow the Bluebook: A Uniform System of Citation, 20th Edition
- 6. The deadline for submission of articles is 4th March, 2025.

Note:

• The sub-themes are suggestive and not exhaustive. Articles not covered under the above sub-themes but relevant to the focus area may also be considered.







• The articles which do not get shortlisted for publication in the first volume may be considered for publication in the second issue of the first volume or the subsequent volumes.

Photo Submission Requirements:

- All submitted photographs must be in digital format.
- Images should be high-resolution (at least 300 DPI) and saved as JPEG files.
- The dimensions of the images should be 8.5x11 inches or less.

Subject Matter and Style:

- Our magazine focuses on the rich cultural heritage and contemporary issues of the tribal people of India and embraces a vibrant and authentic visual style.
- Photographs should align with our editorial vision and content themes, including traditional rituals, cultural festivals, daily life in tribal villages, environmental conservation efforts, and stories of resilience and empowerment within the tribal communities of India.
- We encourage creativity and originality in capturing subjects, avoiding clichés and generic imagery.

Quality Standards:

- Submitted photographs should demonstrate strong composition, lighting, and visual appeal.
- Ensure images are properly exposed, in focus, and free from technical flaws such as noise or blur.
- Minimal post-processing is preferred to maintain the authenticity of the scene.
- Photographers are encouraged to showcase their unique perspectives and creative vision.



Captions and Metadata:

- Each photograph should be accompanied by a descriptive caption providing relevant information about the subject, location, and any relevant context, not exceeding 100 words.
- Include metadata such as the photographer's name, date of capture, and any additional details that enhance the understanding of the image.

Legal and Ethical Considerations:

• By submitting photographs, photographers confirm that they hold the necessary copyright or have obtained appropriate permissions for any recognizable individuals or private property depicted.

Submission Process:

- Please submit photographs along with captions and metadata by 4th March, 2025.

Publication Rights and Compensation:

• By submitting photographs, photographers grant us nonexclusive rights to publish the images in our magazine and related promotional materials.
