In a similar vein, AI tools could contribute to rehabilitating juvenile offenders with personalized assessments, tracking progress, and ensuring rehabilitation programs' effectiveness.

FORMAT for Writing the Articles

The article shall be written in A4 sheet word document and shall follow the following formatting guidelines:

- (i) Times New Roman Font 12 with 1.5 line spacing.
- (ii) All citations shall be placed only in footnotes.
- (iii) Divide your article in sub-parts for easy reading and review
- (iv) *Italics* or *quotes* for emphasising may be used, though rarely.
- (v) Words which are not of English origin should be *italicised*.
- (vi) *Charts, graphs*, etc., may be used (original to be provided with the submission separately)
- (vii) Please submit your manuscript in word format
